

Client Request for Early Transfer

ISR gives you a chance to move to supervised release early if you're actively working to change your thinking and behavior and meet certain requirements.

To qualify, you need to participate in programs like treatment, skill-building, or cognitive-behavioral activities; make progress; follow the rules; and avoid violations.

Before an agent can request your transfer, you must show what you've done to change and lower your risk of reoffending. The agent will review your progress and, if you meet the criteria, send a request to their supervisor for approval. Please provide a response to the below questions:

1. **What actions and thoughts led to your involvement in the criminal justice system?**

Think about what choices or situations created problems for you. What are your risks or triggers? (These could be your past ways of thinking, attitudes, or beliefs.) To figure this out, look at patterns in your past behavior, what pushed you to make certain choices, and what sets off your triggers. This might involve cognitive thinking exercises, writing thinking reports, or using tools like Carey Guides.

2. What changes in your thinking have you made recently to improve decision making and avoid reoffending?

Be specific about how you've worked to avoid repeating past mistakes. What new skills have you learned and applied from programs or exercises that focus on improving your thinking?

3. What changes have you made in your behavior toward friends, family, and substance use?

Over the last few months, how have you changed your actions to stay out of trouble? Think about how your behavior relates to your friends, family, or any issues with drugs or alcohol. Focus on how these changes address key risk factors like peer pressure, family problems, or negative attitudes.

4. If you're in treatment, what have you learned and how have you changed?

Share what lessons you've taken from treatment or group sessions. Explain how you've put these lessons into practice by changing your behavior.

5. What are ways that you will continue to repair harm/make positive contributions while you are on supervision?
